Missionaries & Martyrs Cyril and Methodius

This month, as part of our martyrs and missionaries series, we will remember two brothers who were missionaries to the Slavic peoples of

northeastern Europe: Cyril and Methodius. They were Byzantine Greeks born in the 800's in the city of Thessalonica (the city to whom the two Biblical books of Thessalonians is addressed). In 862, the brothers were sent from Con-stantinople to Moravia (today's eastern Czech Republic). Roman missionaries had already been at work in this area, but due to a lack of a written language,

there was very little success. Cyril and Methodius saw the problem, and they set to work creating first an alphabet, and then translating the holy Scriptures into the Slavic language. Today, this alphabet is called Cyrillic, and it is named after the brother Cyril. The Cyrillic alphabet is used in several eastern European languages including Russian, Ukrainian, Belarussian, Macedonian, etc...

As this was before the Great Schism between the eastern Greek speaking Church and the western Latin speaking Church, Cyril and Methodius were called to Rome in 867 in order to meet with Pope Adrian II. They received his blessing for their work among the slavs, and he even encouraged them to use the Slavonic language in the liturgy. (This was before Rome decided to force every church to use Latin in order to enforce conformity under the pope's authority.) While in Rome, these missionary brothers were ordained as priests. However, Cyril's health was already failing and he died only 50 days after his ordination, and his older brother Methodius continued their work alone.

The pope named Methodius the archbishop over the Slavic territories which caused conflicts with the archbishop of Salzburg who claimed authority in those lands. This disagreement saw Methodius deposed, arrested, and even imprisoned before the pope insisted on his restoration. Part of the conflict revolved around the language used in the liturgy. Methodius insisted on the vernacular saying that the people should be allowed to worship in their own native tongue. However, the Latin churches of the west pushed the use of Latin more and more. This disagreement would continue for hundreds of years. Many believe that a German monk named Martin Luther was partially inspired by the work of Cyril and Methodius when he translated the Bible into German while he was in hiding in the Wartburg Castle.

April 7th—Quasimodo Geniti— "as if newborn babes ..."

† This is the last day of the "Octave of Easter", an eight-day period of feasting beginning on Easter Sunday. The Introit for the day includes I Peter 2:2, "As newborn babes ..."

April 14th—Misericordias Domini—"the goodness of the Lord"

† This Sunday has long been nicknamed "Good Shepherd Sunday" because of the Gospel reading from John 10:11-16.

April 21st—Jubilate—"Shout for joy to God, all the earth ..."

† The Introit for the day is from Psalm 66, a psalm of praise and thanksgiving to God.

April 28th—CANTATE—"Sing!" "Oh, sing to the Lord a new song!"

† The Introit for Cantate Sunday begins with these words from Psalm 98

Spotlight on April's "Hymn of the Month" "I AM CONTENT! MY JESUS EVER LIVES"

"Es ist genug" ("It is enough") was written by composer Johann Joachim Möller in 1662. The melody was written by Johann Rudolph Ahle who collaborated with Möller on the piece.

There is very little history to be found about Möller. He was a German composer and organist who worked for the Elector of Saxony. This hymn, "I Am Content! My Jesus Ever Lives" is the only hymn in our Lutheran Service Book that is attributed to him. The lyrics proclaim a great sense of confidence in the sure and certain hope of eternal life won for us through Christ and His victory over death and the grave.

"Since He in death could perish never, I also shall not die forever. I am content! I am content!"
